A FRESH PERSPECTIVE ON THE SUNDAY READINGS
HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly
Easter Sunday
April 12, 2020

“So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them ‘they have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don’t know where they have put him.’ So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb.... Then the other disciple went in, and he saw and believed. For they did not understand the Scriptures that he had to rise from the dead.”

We can search for the Lord as did Mary of Magdalena. We can run as did Peter and John, and find linen cloths and an empty tomb. Our search continues. We can reflect on our favorite post resurrection stories as recorded in the scriptures and share our belief and Easter joy.

More importantly, we need to look into our own hearts, renew our Easter faith and discover the presence of the Risen Lord in our hearts for the kingdom is near and is within you. May we mirror the joy of the first witnesses of the Risen Lord, as we live Easter every day.

First Reading: Acts 10:34a, 37-43

In this passage, Peter testifies that he and his followers saw the miracles performed by Christ, witnessed His death, and believe in His resurrection. Now they will proclaim to all that Christ is the Son of God.

Second Reading: Colossians 3:1-4

Paul tells the Colossians that they will appear with Christ in glory. They should be mindful of things above rather than things on earth.

Gospel: John 20:1-9

In vivid detail, John tells us that when Mary Magdalene visited Christ's tomb, the tomb was empty. She told the apostles, who ran to the tomb, and saw the “wrappings” on the ground. The disciple who entered first “saw and believed.”

Bishop Gainer Suspends Holy Week & Easter

Bishop Ronald W. Gainer regrettably announced that no public Masses will be celebrated for Palm Sunday, Holy Week or Easter. This difficult decision was made after careful consideration of the decree (In time of COVID-19 (II)) issued by Pope Francis, and in following the recommendations of state and local government and, most especially, out of continued concern for the health and wellbeing of the faithful during these unprecedented times. “Our Diocese, our nation and our world are experiencing the unthinkable with the coronavirus. With this global pandemic in mind, the Holy See, Pope Francis, has decreed that all Holy Week and Easter Masses will be celebrated, but that countries impacted by coronavirus and in cases where restrictions regarding the assembly and movement of people are in place, the bishop and priests may celebrate without the presence of the faithful. With the restrictions and recommendations from our state government, and in consideration of the highly contagious nature of this virus, it would be irresponsible of me to open our parish while still in the midst of this pandemic,” said Bishop Gainer. “Please know the impact of this announcement is not lost on me. I too am deeply hurting by not being able to gather with the faithful for the celebration of Mass. “Although we cannot come together for public Masses during this holiest time of year, our priests will celebrate Holy Week and Easter Masses. Many of our Parishes are live streaming these Masses and I encourage the faithful to participate in Mass through these online means.” Parishes throughout the Diocese have been asked to bless the palms used on Palm Sunday and to make them available for parishioners at a later date. The Chrism Mass in which the Holy Oils used in celebrating the sacraments are blessed and which traditionally is held during Holy Week, and includes a gathering of all priest from the Diocesan order to renew their priestly promises, has also been postponed. A Message From Father Bill

“For even if I am absent in the flesh, yet I am with you in spirit, rejoicing as I observe your good order and firmness of your faith in Christ” (Col. 2:5). Am I feeling what St. Paul was feeling? Yes, I am. Are you? I think we all are: absent from one another but united in spirit. Remember, another term for the Church is the Mystical Body of Christ. That means wherever we are, we are parts of a body – with Jesus Christ as the head. But it’s still hard to be apart from one another during these trying times. Worst of all is the closed church. We can echo the prayer of the prophet Daniel in the fiery

furnace, during a 6th century B.C. persecution, when Jewish public worship was forbidden. Daniel laments to God: “We have in our day no prince, prophet or leader, no holocaust, sacrifice, oblation or incense ... but with contrite heart and humble spirit let us be received” (Daniel 3:38). With “contrite heart and humble spirit” you can still be received, by fervent private prayer and Bible reading at home, both individual and with the family together. Once Mass is over, the video will be available to view anytime in the same way. Because Facebook live is free, we are not in need of donations to cover the cost of this streaming service at this time. We are celebrating private Mass each day and fulfilling all of your Mass intentions. We are doing fine; thanks be to God. Financially, these are difficult times, for both households and churches, but God will take care of us in the long run. If you can, please continue your contributions to your parish church, because we are seriously compromised as well. We have parish staff and school faculty whose paychecks now are seriously in jeopardy, so please help us. Almost all are still working since churches are deemed by the state an essential service. To whatever extent you are able, please be generous to the parish school’s Annual Fund (general school income), the Angel Fund (family tuition assistance), and your purchase and/or sale of Benefit Auction raffle tickets, especially since the big Benefit Auction, our huge annual school fundraiser, might not be held this year. By all means, we wish to keep the school going. Teachers have been valiantly teaching online from home, since the school closure. Thanks for your prayers and support. Hang in there. “And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were called in one body. And be thankful” (Col. 3:15).

An Easter Message From Father Jay

Until the Resurrection of Jesus, the world was confused about the meaning and value of the human sufferings such as illness, pain and death. And people were greatly troubled at it. It was Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who became man and dwelt among men and women on earth, unraveled the mystery of suffering and death. The widespread pandemic of the coronavirus raises the question, “Why is this?” to all human beings, especially the believers of God and more especially the Christian believers. We, Catholics, accept this coronavirus in the spirit of Jesus and Mary. Jesus foretold thrice about his manner of death. He suffered the trial before his death, his journey of carrying the cross to Calvary and his crucifixion, knowing full well that there was going to be his Resurrection on the third day after his death. Our Blessed Mother Mary accompanied the most tortuous journey of Jesus to Calvary and stood by his cross watching his death and listening to his desperate cry just before his death, **“My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?”** (Mt 27:46) She simply suffered in her heart with the serious and hurting question, “Why is this happening to my sinless son, the Son of God?” She didn’t know the answer but simply believed in God and accepted the suffering and death of her blessed son. (Lk 2:51) She could accept the mystery contained in the suffering and death of her blessed son as she accepted the mystery in conceiving him in her blessed womb. The mystery involved in the entire life of Jesus until his death did not confuse her faith. Rather, the mystery of her son became her strength to live her life with her renewed obedience to God which she had made at the Annunciation, **“Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word.”** (Lk 1:38) For three days, Our Blessed Mother had to live in her mind and heart, body and soul, with the mystery of the suffering and death of Jesus. In my

belief, it was Our Blessed Mother who had the privilege to see her blessed son who is now the Risen Lord. Sunday, the third day, unraveled the mystery of human suffering and death. The whole world began the new journey to live for eternal life and to live with eternal life. The present widespread coronavirus should be seen and accepted with the attitude of our Blessed Mother. This is the moment we must bear witness to our Christian faith to all non-Christians and unbelievers around us and around the world. Coronavirus is a mystery to others but not to us Christians because we believe in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ has conquered death through his own suffering and death. Coronavirus has no power over our Christian faith. Like St. Paul let us challenge the mysterious virus, **“Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?”** (1 Cor 15:55) This is the right time to seek our Blessed Mother through the prayer, “Hail Mary”. This prayer has been used by over a billion Catholics through centuries. We could add some more words in this prayer, “Pray for us sinners, now at the fear of our death and at the hour of our death, Amen.” Our Blessed Mother is called the ‘Co-Redeemer’ as Jesus is “The Redeemer.” For, only Jesus and Mary were the only people in human history, not affected by bacteria and virus. They did not suffer any illness on account of the bacteria and virus. The saving power of Jesus will assist us now. The powerful witness of our Blessed Mother and Queen will not fail us, at this moment of our life, the pandemic. **Happy Easter!**
